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Urgent Sports Injury Clinic for Student Athletes Re-Opens for Fall Season

*Saturday morning clinic in Portland provides access to sports medicine specialists
and a less-costly alternative to emergency room visits for sports-related injuries*

PORTLAND, ME (August 24, 2010) – With the return of Friday night high school football, soccer and field hockey comes inevitable sports-related injuries associated with high impact, fast-paced field sports – and potentially costly visits to the hospital emergency room. To provide injured student athletes with an alternative to the emergency room for treatment of bruises, sprains and fractures, OA Centers for Orthopaedics has re-opened its urgent sports injury clinic for the fall athletic season.

OA first tested a walk-in, urgent sports injury clinic in the fall of 2009. With that success, the clinic will re-open along with the start of the fall high school sports season on Saturday, September 4. Staffed by orthopedic [sports medicine specialists](#), the OA urgent sports injury clinic is open every Saturday morning through October 30, 2010 beginning at 9:00 a.m. Athletes may walk in without an appointment to see a sports medicine doctor for their injury.

With high costs, potentially long waits and a likely referral from the emergency room doctor to an orthopedic sports medicine doctor for treatment and observation, a trip to the emergency room is not necessarily the best course of action, but alternatives have been lacking, especially in Maine.

“Injured athletes in Southern Maine now have an alternative to costly and time intensive emergency room visits,” says John Wipfler, CEO of the OA Centers for Orthopaedics. “Not only that, OA is providing Saturday morning access to the same physicians that take

care of such teams as the U.S. Men's Olympic Soccer team, the Portland Sea Dogs and many other professional, international, collegiate and high school athletes.”

According to Harvard Pilgrim Health Care, the cost of a typical emergency room visit in Maine ranges from \$250 to \$1,040, and sports-related injuries account for a significant percentage of those visits among children and teens. In fact, the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality reports that sports-related injuries – bruises and fractures – accounted for 22% of hospital emergency visits in U.S. children ages 5-17 in 2006, with teens five times more likely than younger children to need sports-related emergency room treatment. Ninety-nine percent of these sports sports-related emergency room visits were treated and released without hospitalization.

The urgent sports injury clinic is available at OA's Portland office, located at 33 Sewall Street in Portland.
